At the latest with the case of the former German speed skater Claudia Pechstein and the case of the former Romanian footballer Adrian Mutu, who were both sanctioned for doping or liable for damages and who brought their case before the European Court of Human Rights (ECHR), the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS/TAS) also became known to the general public. The Swiss Federal Supreme Court has also already expressed its opinion on various issues relating to the CAS.

The sometimes very enthusiastically led discussion mainly concerns issues of the impartiality of the CAS, access to justice and the right to a fair trial. The CAS was established in 1984 by a task force upon the initiative of the then IOC President Juan Antonio Samaranch. The aim was to have the jurisdiction of an independent specialized arbitral tribunal that would decide sports disputes in a flexible, speedy and inexpensive procedure.


